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PASTOR'S COLUMN

In the near future we will be installing two 80" LCD screens in the front of the Sanctuary and an additional one in the rear of the sanctuary. This fulfills a long-standing goal from the 2017 Capital Campaign initiative to update our electronic capabilities here at GPC.

Last year we received at no cost to the church, two brand new 80" LCD screens through a project led by Randall Ackerman. They have been in storage waiting for the wiring to be installed and for a contractor to install them. These hi-def screens new and barely used, came from a Manhattan, New York data center and were completely refurbished. They were given to GPC as a gift-in-kind, costing the church no money. Their size, combined with their high-resolution feature makes them ideal for a room the size of our sanctuary

Why should we have LCD screens in the sanctuary? There are actually many positive benefits. As we grow and seek to reach out to unchurched persons in the community, we certainly desire to introduce them to a Gospel and a Christian life that makes sense in this chaotic contemporary time we are living in.

Video screens appeal to people who have been raised with TV and video. Younger people are comfortable with technology; and, in part, are defined by it. CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE

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Screens bring worshipers' eyes and focus up rather than down. This can lead to more of a recognition of the community at work together rather than the individual. When worshipers focus more up than down, there is more interaction and engagement with the liturgist and the preacher.

While we have a firm commitment to continuing to use our hymnals, video projection of hymn texts, Scripture, liturgy, and other elements of worship

places an emphasis on words and text. Those with vision issues find it easier to read from the Hymnals will screen. always be a primary feature in worship, as the tunes, lyrics and musical notation enhance our understanding in worship. The hymns of our faith are a deep and significant part of our Reformed heritage and our wor-

ship experience. The feel of a hymnal always is important for me just as is the connection with our history.

Use of projection allows for selection of worship materials from a wider range than what is contained in a hymnal. Also, video projection allows for incorporation of multimedia (audio, video, film, illustrations, art) in worship. This can add greatly to understanding sermon texts just as a picture is often worth a thousand words, as the old proverb tells us.

Using copyrighted materials on-screen does mean we have to be attentive to copyright laws and usage. Although for at least 30 years, most congregations, including ours, have been purchasing licenses and permissions that are provided by a yearly subscription.

The screens are a tool to help us learn, understand and gain insight into our faith in worship as well as in getting useful imagery for an intelligent and growing congregation. The outcome studies from churches with long-term use of screens is that they engage the congregation in auditory, visual and kinesthetic ways simply because they add to the multisensory experience in worship. Nor will they detract from the aesthetics of the Sanctuary.

Over the course of my ministry, I've been a part of a huge transition through technology of how a congregation can express its most basic purpose: sharing the good news of Jesus Christ. When I first

> began ministry, bulletins were cranked out (literally) on a mimeograph. Then we bought copiers. We used phone chains to communicate emergencies or prayer chains. Now we use texts and email blasts.

> I have served churches that had no sound amplification and that was in the mid-1980's. They purchased a mic and

amplifiers from Radio Shack back then and that was considered to be a huge step. Now we would be lost without our high-quality sound systems. Few would ever return to the days without them. Furthermore, we send simulcasts out to the world every Sunday and the number of views and viewers are constantly increasing.

There was no internet in the early 1980's but now we use it for everything. Phones went from black desktop models to portable receivers with antennas to cell phones that are truly modern wonders. All these devices have helped us to advance our mission. Screens are just the next logical step in our mission.

We will have a learning curve on how they will be best used. Your input is certainly invited in this. Our goal is to have the best quality worship experience that both draws us closer to Jesus Christ and helps our congregation grow in faith.

40 Days of Renewal

What is Lent?

It is a 40-day season of prayer, fasting, and alms giving that is a preparation for Easter.

What is Easter?

It is the commemoration and celebration of what God did for us through Jesus Christ.

What did Jesus do?

He lived among us and gave us a vision of a full life (not just a religion). He suffered and died on a cross, not as a sign of failure, but as a testimony of the greatest love a person can show for a friend – to die for him. Through that death Jesus entered a new life, and he opened the door for us to share with him the same fullness of life, a life that can begin here and now and go on without end.

Why six weeks?

Six weeks is about 40 days, and Jesus spent 40 days in the desert preparing for his work and mission.

How are we to prepare for Easter?

The Gospel suggests three areas: prayer, fasting and giving alms. These practices are common to all major religions: Judaism, Hinduism, Buddhism, Islam and Christianity. **In practice, how are we to do these things?** Each person needs to make his or her own choices.

Prayer can include:

- Setting aside a short period for meditation or reflection
- Doing some Bible reading and study
- Visiting a prayer website or listen to a podcast

Fasting can involve:

- Traditionally, people have given up some nice thing they like but don't really need, like sweets, chocolate, dessert.
- Many can cut down on alcohol or nicotine or any other addictive substance, perhaps as part of a permanent giving up. It can help to motivate if we remember these things are not very good for us anyway.

Alms giving can:

- Be linked to fasting. For example, money saved from giving up superfluities may be redirected to helping those who do not have necessities for life.
- Help us become more aware of the needs of others.
- Help us to realise that real fulfilment comes in making my contribution to building a more just society for all.

What else is important about Lent?

Lent is a time to become more aware of what life is about, to become more aware of how I want to use my life, my gifts, my education. Let us strive to use this Lenten season in a really constructive and productive way.


