Why Support Missionaries?

GPC supports three missionary concerns at present. One is domestic, in Kentucky. The other two are in Honduras and a couple who are based in Cyprus. In terms of actual costs, our support for these missions is just a small percentage of our yearly spending plan. But the benefits to both the church and those on the field is very large. GPC also designates 10% of its income for missions and missionaries and has had this commitment for many years.

Since the founding of the Church 2,000 years ago, sending people out as missionaries has been an important part of sharing the Gospel. Jesus sent the 12 disciples out on an extended mission to proclaim the good News of God’s love. (see Luke 10:1-23) They preached, taught, brought healings and encouragement to a demoralized people.

In the Book of Acts we read how Barnabus was commissioned as a missionary and sought our Paul to go with him. Their success was beyond all expectations. (See: Acts 11:25-26) Later, Paul continued as a missionary taking with him Silas and Timothy.

Paul in reflecting on his experience wrote: **“How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the**

one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? 15 And how can anyone preach unless they are sent? As it is written: "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"

(See: Romans 10:14-15)

There are many kinds of mission endeavors in our contemporary time. Some are evangelistic missionaries. Others serve in foreign and domestic fields as medical missionaries, educational missionaries, agricultural missionaries, aviation missionaries, missionaries who administrate orphanages, care facilities and hospitals and many others. God calls people from churches to use their gifts on behalf of the Church to represent the Church on the field.


GPC supports the Laurel Mission in Kentucky. We support with funding and also with people-power. As members of GPC, along with partners from the Prince Street Church in Shippensburg, we go to the Laurel Mission every year to help with many projects. Dori Hjalmarson is a Presbyterian missionary to the Presbyterian Churches in Honduras. She is active within the Churches there and assists with needs of the people who are quite impoverished. Michael and Grace are active in the Middle East. They reach out to students, refugees and people dislocated by war with support and encouragement. They also host correspondence classes and online classes. Those whom we support have dedicated their lives to serve the cause of Christ.

When a church supports missionaries, it helps the church to see God's greater vision for reaching our world. When a missionary itinerates to their supporting churches, not only are they sharing their accountability but the local church is informed about the work the missionary does on behalf of the supporting congregation. Not everyone is called to be a missionary. But everyone in church can be a practical partner with the missionaries. Meeting them is a true delight and you meet people who are deeply committed to Christ.

Our encouragement and prayerful support of our missionaries means so much to them. They often have lonely and difficult circumstances. In Philippians 4:15–20, Paul wrote:

You Philippians yourselves know that in the beginning of the gospel, when I left Macedonia, no church entered into partnership with me in giving and receiving, except you only. Even in Thessalonica you sent me help for my needs once and again. Not that I seek the gift, but I seek the fruit

PROPERTY & MAINTENANCE

Several months ago, I was having a conversation with a friend and the subject of the weather came into discussion. He mentioned to me that it had rained in our area on fifteen of the first twenty Saturdays of 2024. I remember replying that although that is a disappointing event for those of us who still work, that I would not complain about the much needed rain and that I hoped that our area would continue to get those periodic showers as we moved from Spring into the Summer months. I guess I was hoping (and praying) for balance. One of the scriptural passages that most of us are familiar with is Ecclesiastes 3 that reads "For everything there is a season, a time for every activity under heaven..." I hope and pray that whatever season each of you are experiencing, that you find that balance and answer in your prayers. Until then, please be safe and be careful in this heat as we wait for more rain, and so many other things that our community and our world needs. Most importantly, we have our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

A brief update on our activities:

PROJECTS STARTED:

I am not sure how many of you noticed, but one of recessed light bulbs in the sanctuary ceiling has gone out. After asking some of our friends who know best, we believe that these bulbs will need to be accessed (and replaced) from below, or inside the sanctuary. Since such a replacement would require either a lift or scaffolding, we have pursued quoting this work to replace all eight bulbs at one time, and our intent will be to replace them with LED bulbs that will last longer and generate less heat and use less energy. Since no one seems to be aware of the wattage, we will likely have to address the wattage as the work begins. Every effort will be made to replace the bulbs with ones of equivalent wattage or lumens. A quote for this work has been approved by the Session, although a start date has not been received as of the time of

this writing.

Earlier this year, during the annual fire alarm system inspection, I received a phone call from a frustrated technician regarding the difficulty in opening the ceiling trap door in the west vestibule. This is the only place to access the devices in the attic that are required to be inspected and maintained. He asked if we could look into improving this access that, as of today, requires using a very tall extension ladder to push open the hatch. While his initial suggestion was a rope and pulley system, I began to look into alternatives that could be used that would work but not have a negative impact on the aesthetics of the vestibule. After some research, I found an electric rope hoist option that can be operated remotely and will not be visible from the vestibule. I discussed this option with our electrician and asked if he would quote this installation. This option and quote was presented to the Session members for vote, and approval was given. I have purchased the hoist and confirmed that it operates as anticipated. This device should allow for any technician to raise their ladders without the added concern of pushing open the trap door. Again, no start date has been given as of this writing.

PROJECTS COMPLETED:

During the week of the Community Camp, I made one of my regular evening walk-throughs to check on the building. Again, I noticed that something sounded amiss with the mini-split head in the Youth Room. Earlier this year, we had contacted Premier HVAC Services and informed them that the blower unit was much louder than it should be and they were in to replace this blower unit. I asked Sue Miller to give them a call about the noise, and they came in and found that some insulation tape had come loose and was rubbing the blower wheel. This has been fixed under warranty, so no charge to the church. There were other members who noticed this during the camp and informed me of this same issue. Thanks to those for doing so.

I am well supplied, having received from Epaphroditus the gifts you sent, a fragrant offering, a sacrifice acceptable and pleasing to God. And my God will supply every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus. To our God and Father be glory forever and ever. Amen.

Churches also are encouraged to pray with, correspond with and enter into a real relationship with missionaries it supports. Being a missionary is often a dangerous occupation. Those serving on the field are greatly encouraged by our prayers and letter, whether by email or snail mail. Missionaries need prayer partners. We do not support missionaries expecting to get something back, but we support them believing in the importance and urgency of missions, and trusting that God will use them to change the world. By doing so we will be a big part in spreading the word of God among the nations, and that is our greatest blessing.

Sending missionaries is one of the oughts' and shoulds of the Bible. Our all-knowing and all-loving Christ knows that we will prosper as they should only as we look beyond our own immediate interests and lift up our eyes to God's global purpose.
