
PRAYER BOOKMARKS

PASTOR'S COLUMN

omeone recently asked me what is the difference between justification and sanctification. I love it when I get asked these kinds of questions. They are central to living a Christian life.

Justification by faith is the opposite of justification by our works of obedience to the law. Basically, no one can work their way into heaven. It is God's free gift by simply believing. As Paul says it in Romans, "we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law" (Rom. 3:28). Imagine you are standing at someone's door. They invite you in. You believe their invitation is gracious and you trust them; so, you enter. It's that simple. "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and be saved." (Acts 16:31)

Paul also draws an enlightening contrast between the worker and the believer: "Now to the one who works, his wages are not counted as a gift but as his due. And to the one who does not work but believes in him who justifies the ungodly, his faith is counted as righteousness" (Rom. 4:4–5). Recall that Jesus also teaches that the one who is justified before God is not the one who boasts in his or her own righteousness but the sinner who

cries out to God for mercy. Now, sanctification is what we want once we are in the house.

Sanctification results from the supernatural presence and power of the Holy Spirit working in a Christian's life. It requires a change of heart, an alignment of the will with God's will. It is a work of grace in that God's Spirit is at work in the process of transforming you from someone self-centered, or afraid, or bigoted, or incapable of empathy to one who reflects the love and peace of Jesus in their heart and in their everyday living. It's a lifelong process.


In its most basic sense, to sanctify something is to set it apart for God's special use and purpose. Therefore, God's people are sometimes said to be sanctified because they are set apart for God's special purposes in the world: "Consecrate yourselves, therefore, and be holy; for I am the LORD your God. Keep my statutes, and do them; I am the LORD who sanctifies you" (Leviticus 20:7-8).

Olympic athletes consecrate their daily life and living to pursue the skills and abilities needed in their particular sport so as to compete at the highest

level. They strive to give it their personal best. A far greater goal is to pursue our friendship with Jesus so we reflect the values and teachings he shares with us as we read in the Gospels.

Garrison Keillor often talks about growing up in a small Christian group he calls the "Sanctified Brethren." He speaks of the way they restricted their speech, the way they interacted with others who did not belong to their sect and the way they were to "shun the world and worldly pursuits." Of course, Keillor is poking at the way his group practiced outwardly but really were anything by sanctified. They fussed and argued and treated one another poorly sometimes. Outward demonstrations of religious practice tend to make of us rather like the Pharisees Jesus spoke of.

Think of the process of sanctification as cooperating with the Holy Spirt in learning to live with our neighbors and love them. If justification is re-



spondeding to the free invitation to walk in the door, sanctification is learning how to live with those in the house. Anyone who has lived in military barracks, or summer camp quarters or in college dorms knows that there will be those who are

we are asked to accept them, care for them, respect them and learn to get along with them

different from you and may not share your values. You may never feel close with some. But we are asked to accept them, care for them, respect them and learn to get along with them. Often, God's Spirit uses people we don't understand as the edge-stones to rub off the rough edges on ourselves.

Curiously, we will find we don't always see eye-toeye with others in church. Creating a fuss, gossiping about another or simply ignoring them is definitely not what Jesus has in mind. Sanctification then is the process of growing us up as mature people who will care and appreciate others and not fear them or ignore them. If we cannot learn how to love others in our congregation, what do we have to offer to those beyond our doors?

We who are the Presbyterian congregation in Greencastle have something very special and lifegiving to our community. What we have is the presence of Jesus among us. And he is working through us to love one another and to share that healing love with our community. We have all been called and set apart through Jesus for this reason. So, sanctification is growing up and letting Jesus be seen in us. It's how we become real followers of Jesus—and that is what we truly want to be.

APPLAUSE IN A WORSHIP SERVICE

From time to time in a worship service someone might offer a moving musical piece, a deeply felt song or anthem and we might offer applause.

Some in our congregation have expressed concern and the opinion that applause is not appropriate during worship. Applause makes it seem that those being applauded have "performed" to please the congregation rather than offered their praise to God. And it raises the possibility that those who lead in worship may come to expect the applause and be hurt if others were applauded and they were not. What guidance do we have beyond our varying opinions?

We have guidance from the Bible and our *Book of Order*. Since applause almost seems always to occur in connection with music, instrumental or vocal, we should note that the *Book of Order* says,

"In worship, music is not to be for entertainment or artistic display." (W-2.1004)

This observation is made in the context of music being described as a form of worship by a choir or soloist or a musician. The appropriate response is not by clapping, but in saying "Amen."

We can never go wrong when we put God first.


