Virtual Motions: ACTION. On January 20, 2025, approved use of the Sanctuary on the morning of Thursday, May 1, 2025, for the Greencastle-Antrim National Day of Prayer Service sponsored by the Greencastle Ministerium and the Greencastle-Antrim Christian Women's Fellowship Service to begin at 11:00 am. ACTION. On January 21, 2025, approved Special Called Congregational Meeting for February 9, 2025, to present the slate of members of the Pastor Nominating Committee. NOTE: Rescheduled from January 19, 2025, because of cancellation of Worship Service and Special Called Congregation Meeting due to snow. ACTION. On February 1, 2025, approved Rev. Dr. Michael Koplitz to fill our pulpit on February 2, 2025, with assistance from Kelsey Marhsall, MDiv. to officiate Communion due to Pastor Bob's unexpected absence because of sickness.

Worship: ACTIONS. Approved recognition of Technology Team members with gift cards (\$100.00 each) to local restaurants to be presented in front of congregation on a Sunday. Approved Kentucky Mission presentation by Polly Coulter, Mission Committee Chair, on Sunday, February 17. 2025. Approved commissioning members of the Pastor Nominating Committee on Sunday, February 17.

Christian Education: ACTIONS. Approved Sunrise Service for April 20, 2025, at 7:30 am. Approved funding the enrollment fee for participants of the Chambersburg Project; July 6 – 11, 2025.

Finance: Because no Worship Service was held on Per Capita Sunday due to inclement weather, reminders about this opportunity for stewardship will be made from the pulpit and in various media venues.

Personnel: ACTION. Approved hiring a Youth Group Leader to plan, coordinate and supervise the activities of the Youth Group (grades 6 through 12), generally every other Sunday evening for 9 to 10 months during the school year with salary not to exceed \$5,000.00 annually.

Property & Maintenance: Roof of the Educational Wing was replaced.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Bob and Scott Peterson will be in front of the church on Wednesday March

5th from Noon to 12:30 Pm to do "Ashes to Go". Session to begin the development of a transition plan over the next few months as the PNC begins its work. We hope to have a smooth pastoral transition and that happens best as we plan it out. Session members are invited to come up with plans.

Pastor Bob will be offering a Lenten Bible study the six (6) Thursday mornings of Lent at 10 AM. We hope to hold these studies at the Brio Coffee Shop. Pastor Bob will assist in a Bible study with Presbyterian Women one Thursday each month at 1 pm in the Edwards Room. ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) has the legal authority to come into houses of worship to conduct immigration raids, arrests and other enforcement actions even in churches which traditionally have been places of sanctuary. The PCUSA has joined with other Church bodies in a suit to oppose this.

Pastor Nominating Committee: The first meeting of the Pastor Nominating Committee was held on Tuesday, February 11, 2025, with the Rev. Kristal Smith, Presbytery Leader for Governance and Congregational Leadership, the Rev. Dr. Jamie McLeod, Presbytery Leader for Transformation and Vision and the Rev. Vern Gauthier, Commission on Ministry Liaison for Greencastle Presbyterian Church. Their next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, February 20, 2025, at 7:30 pm

New Business: ACTION. Approved bringing forward a motion at our April 6, 2025 Congregational Meeting for our membership to vote on a change to our Bylaws so GPC's Bylaws mirror the form of government identified in our Book of Order, G-1.0506. Current Bylaws state "The Clerk of Session shall be secretary of the meetings of this Congregation. In his/her inability to attend, the Session shall designate a secretary pro tem." Recommendation: The Clerk of Session shall serve as secretary for all meetings of the congregation. If the Clerk of Session Is unable to serve, the congregation shall elect a secretary for that meeting. The secretary shall record the actions of the congregation in the minutes of the meeting.

The meeting was closed in prayer with The Lord's Prayer in unison at 8:00 pm.

PASTOR'S COLUMN

Holy Week and Easter offer all Christians opportunities to dive deeper into why they believe in God, in Jesus and in the way of life that Jesus lays out for us when Jesus calls us to follow him,

In I Peter 3:15, he wrote to the early Christian community, "...But in your hearts regard Christ the Lord as holy, ready at any time to give a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you."

There is a fancy theological word for this: Apologetics. That word does mean apologizing for your faith as if its an embarrassment. Quite the opposite. An apologetic aims to defend and explain the Christian faith and its core beliefs to those who just don't know the Christian story or to those who doubt its truthfulness. An apologetic seeks to provide a rational and compelling case for belief.

Jesus demonstrated the truth of his message and his identity over and over again, using nearly every method at his disposal, including miracles, prophecy, a godly style of life, authoritative teaching and reasoned debate.

In Acts 17:2–4 Luke notes that Jews, God-fearing Greeks, and many women in Thessalonica were persuaded that Paul's message was true. Here, he spent three days in a Jewish synagogue reasoning from the Scriptures "explaining and proving that it was necessary for the Christ to suffer and to rise from the dead" and demonstrating that "Jesus, whom I proclaim to you, is the Christ" (v. 3).

Church people miss significant opportunities to share their faith. It might be shyness; or perhaps some don't have the facts of faith at hand. Many churches and pastors may never even use the word "apologetic" much less define what it means. Well-trained and well-versed Christians learn to know how to share their faith and explain what their hope is all about in intelligent, sensitive and respectful ways. And, since six out of ten people

who would come to a church service attend because a relative or friend invited them, it is wise for everyone in our congregation to know how to give an answer for our faith.

So, where do we begin? First of all is a familiarity with the Bible. It can be hard work in a way. Nonetheless, it is good work to do. Simply reading the Bible just as it is will give you a lot of questions for you to follow up on and research. There are many good books that will help you understand the important questions every Christian should deal with for themselves. Questions such as, "How can I understand the existence of God? Or, "why if God is good do bad things happen to good people?" Is Jesus just a storybook character or was he a real person 2000 years ago:"

How can I understand the existence of God?

I think it is important to study about Jesus' death and resurrection. Many will say that he was never raised, but the disciples stole his body and buried it. Or, that after being taken down from the cross and then placed in a cold tomb, Jesus revived and made his way out of Jerusalem. Or, others might say that the Holy Spirit came upon the human Jesus at his baptism and left him as he died on the cross. (I will say that anyone tortured near to death, brutally crucified and with a deep spear wound into their chest cavity—the blood having separated—would not have climbed out of a tomb a few hours later—because they would actually be dead!) If Jesus wasn't raised from the dead, then what? Because Jesus was raised from the dead. then what is our response?

Apologetics is directed towards doubt. One engaged in such a conversation needs to keep in mind that your direction is to counter doubt. It is never to try to bully a person with whatever your

facts may be. Deep respect for what the person with whom you're conversing is everything. Frankly, this faith is not so much about facts. We cannot prove the existence of God. It is an article of faith. But there is a very credible argument for the truth of Christianity in the lives today whom Jesus has transformed.

Of course, some will say that there are too many hypocrites in church. While that may be true, there are very many hypocrites in every other part of a community. That direction always gets you off into the weeds, so to speak. The point to make is about the goodness of God who came to us in love and sends Jesus to reveal the love of God to a world in confusion. Stay on track. It's about Jesus and not the church person you know who is a regular rummy. The Bible gives a very robust presentation of God's work through history and in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. The resurrection is the fulcrum upon which this faith rises or falls.

If nothing else, Jesus' teaching and person challenge how we live our lives in a world that increases in violence, confusion and self-centeredness—leading to further violence, fear, and war. Jesus offers a transforming way to live that brings peace and positive transformation to an entire society.

If this congregation will continue and thrive in a world indifferent or even hostile to our faith; or worse—co-opt it into something with no purpose or message, it is your task and mine to be able to give a good and wise answer for our faith.


