PASTOR'S COLUMN

REV. DR. ROBERT COOK *Interim Pastor*

The writer, Sarah Ban Breathnach tells of a business trip her husband took to the beach, where she and her daughter enjoyed the mornings while he attended workshops. One afternoon it was announced that there would be elephant rides for the children in the hotel parking lot. Her daughter, Katie, was delirious with excitement. Sarah told her, "Life is always full of wonderful surprises if we're open to them. Some mornings you get up not knowing what will happen, and you get to ride an elephant that day!"

When they got home, there was an invitation for Sarah to join a group of journalists on a trip to Ireland. She was tired of traveling, and not really a spontaneous person, so she told them she would probably not go. Her husband, overhearing her, said, "So, you're not going to ride the elephant?" She decided to go.

Being open in a world that has closed itself off to kindness, compassion and self-giving service, is becoming increasingly difficult. Frankly, it's just getting to be scary "out there." But this is not the time to shut ourselves out from the world around us. Instead, this is a time to trust God to direct us each day in this adventure of faith.

I'm not naïve about the happenings around us. They demonstrate what society is like when character, manners, decency and above all, walking in the way of Jesus have been forgotten—or never tried. What history

demonstrates is that those who believe the iron rule of society is power, force and violence will find themselves consumed and destroyed by such values. Many of us lived many decades in the 20th century. The wars that the depravity of just a few people started killed millions including those who planned these wars. Those who used their skills and talent for evil were consumed by the evil themselves. Force, power and violence don't win. They just destroy everything.

But there are so many, many people who live to do justly, to love mercy and to walk humbly with God. And they repair and rebuild and redeem lives, families, communities and nations. And they tend to live with a sense of expectancy and trust. That gives such folks the attitude that each day is good. That God is guiding and that the unexpected may just be a great blessing. These are folks who believe that you just might wake up some morning and have the joyous pleasure of riding an elephant. God has wonderful surprises if we are just open to trust God for them.

St Paul, writing to the churches in Galatia said: "**So let's not get tired of doing what is good. At just the right time we will reap a harvest of blessing if we don't give up.**" (Gal 6:9 -New Living Translation) Despite the bad news, the anger and the bullying and the desperate struggles across this old world, we don't give up. Instead, we expect that every day God can use our hands or words, or eyes or heart to bless and bring light and grace and healing to someone. Just be open and expectant for God to use you.

Our daily part then is to do no harm; to do all the good we can all the time we can to all the people we meet; and to stay in love with God That sets us up for a great adventure in practical faith! And you just never know what good can come in even the smallest of ways. So, I live in faith and God is guiding me, and if it shows up today, I'm ready to ride an elephant! I hope you are ready too! Stay faithful; stay hopeful.

GPC held the REGULAR SESSION MEETING on Thursday, December 11, 2025 in the Social Room beginning at 6:30 pm. The meeting was opened with the lighting of the candle. Ruling Elder JoAnne Lewis offered a devotion and Pastor Bob offered a prayer.

The Moderator was Pastor Robert Cook.

Session welcomed Ed Wine to the Session Meeting, per his request, to provide an update about the proposed land swap between the Moss Spring Cemetery and the Greencastle Area Franklin Country Water Authority (GAFCWA).

Moss Spring Graveyard Association: Approved the Joint Meeting of the Moss Spring Graveyard Association and Session to begin at 6:35 pm. Ed provided an update on Greencastle Presbyterian Church's property ownership of the cemetery, property deed and the proposed land swap between the Church and the GAFCWA. Session agreed with the work completed and the work Ed anticipates in the coming six months. The Session extended its gratitude to Ed for his extensive property records research and continuing work with the GAFCWA. Approved the closure of the Joint Meeting and return to the Regular Session Meeting at 6:48 pm.

Clerk's Report: ACTIONS: Approved minutes of November 11, 2025 Regular Session meeting. Church Roll through November 30, 2025 is 147. Worship attendance on December 7, 2025 was 98 with Communion celebrated by 91 and 24 joining via livestream. Per Capita giving to date is 41% of total membership. We look forward to serving by:


- Offering home communion to our shut-ins. Deacons will be coordinating with Pastor Cook.

The Transfiguration of the Lord

Transfiguration Sunday celebrates the glorious revelation of God in Jesus Christ and Christ's manifestation as the fulfillment of the law and the prophets. Jesus' radiant appearance on the mountaintop evokes the devouring fire of the glory of the LORD at Mount Sinai (Exodus 24.17). Here, as at Jesus' baptism, God claims him as a beloved child, in whom God is well pleased.

In their account of this event, the synoptic gospels offer an enlightening tableau vivant, with Christ flanked by Moses, representing the law, and Elijah, representing the prophetic tradition. With this vivid image, the gospel writers demonstrate the relationship of the human Word of God to the tradition of Israel and set forth the hermeneutic by which they read the Hebrew Scriptures.



Hope of the ages

An excerpt from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship (Geneva Press, 2003, 148-149)

The Sunday immediately prior to Ash Wednesday is an appropriate time to celebrate the Transfiguration of the Lord, because this event marked a transition in Jesus' ministry in which he "set his face to go to Jerusalem" (Luke 9:51), where he would die.

In Jesus' transfiguration, we are assured that Jesus is the hope of the ages. Jesus is the One who fulfilled the Law given through Moses, the one dreamed of by the prophets, of whom Elijah is the greatest.

In celebrating this event, we rejoice in the divine majesty of Christ, whose glory shone even when confronted with the cross. It is given us for our journey through Lent toward the agony of the cross and the victory of the empty tomb. We celebrate this mystery in order that our faith may be renewed. We are transformed into the new being in Christ as we join Christ in his death and resurrection in Lent and Easter.
